Ehud Discussion

Remember that these monologues are essentially historical fiction, based on the Scripture but filling in plausible subjective details, both emotional responses and motivations. Your first task is to decide if they are reasonable.

Is every account in the Scripture there for a reason?

What can we learn from this account of Ehud?

How did Ehud get a weapon past the security system of Eglon, ruler of Moab?

Who should get the credit for that?

Are the providential acts of God being parodied by Star Wars "use the force"?

Does that have an effect on people today in their ability to detect Divine intervention?

Can a Christian ethically be involved in a just war?

Is this account justifying deception and treachery?

What had changed after this event that caused the people of Israel to answer the summons and fight back against their oppressors?

Do we sometimes lack the courage to fight battles that we know the LORD wants us to fight?

Does this account give us any direct guidance on actions God wants us to take?

Do we know how Ehud was sure God wanted him to assassinate Eglon?

Is the Scripture saying anything about obesity?
