Elijah Discussion

Remember that these monologues are essentially historical fiction, based on the Scripture but filling in plausible subjective details, both emotional responses and motivations. Your first task is to decide if they are reasonable.

Might Elijah have been tempted by spiritual pride because of the power he was allowed to wield?

Have you even felt like you were tasked with something like giving a message to Ahab and Jezebel?

If you were Elijah, might you have been tempted to question God's organizational skills when the brook you depended on went dry?

Would the never-ending supply of meal and oil for the widow have strengthened your faith?

How about when her only son died.

What was God doing for Elijah's faith?

Did it take faith for Obadiah to trust Elijah?

How does your own most severe spiritual challenge compare with Elijah's contest on the mountain?

Could Elijah be called "The Trash-talking Prophet?"

How did his confidence likely affect the enemy?

Was it fair that the losing contestants be killed?

What does Jezebel's threat tell us about her?

What does Elijah's response tell us about him?

How can that be encouraging to us?

How does the LORD bring Elijah back to ministry?

How accurate was Elijah's estimate of the number of believers left in Israel?

What was God doing when he gave Elijah more duties before he "passed the torch"?

Would Elisha likely have known Elijah?

Did God seem to be giving Ahab a chance to separate his own fate from that of Jezebel?

Was it right or wrong for Elisha to ask for a double portion of his spirit?

What usually comes with spiritual power?
