Remember that these monologues are essentially historical fiction, based on the Scripture but filling in plausible subjective details, both emotional responses and motivations. Your first task is to decide if they are reasonable.

Why do you think the LORD allowed Naaman to get leprosy?

What was Naaman's most serious problem?

What had to happen to him before he could be healed from his leprosy?

What are the hazards of success?

Might it be easy to consider the presence of the Israelite slave girl in his home a coincidence?

Might it have been hard for Naaman to take advice from servants?

How did the way things were done help shape his character?

What does Elisha's servant's behavior tell you about his spiritual state?

Is it likely the Naaman had an impact on his people after being healed?

Can you imagine a conversation with the king or with some of his military colleagues after he came back healed?

Would Naaman have been enthusiastic?

How is it that despite seeing miraculous power, the king of Aram failed to connect the dots and recognized the power of the LORD God of Israel?

What is the most important factor in converting a person to faith in the true God?

Why is it so hard for some people?
