## Seth Discussion

Remember that these monologues are essentially historical fiction, based on the Scripture but filling in plausible subjective details, both emotional responses and motivations. Your first task is to decide if they are reasonable.

Can you imagine becoming aware of a dark history in your family?

Do you have a "black sheep" in your own family?

Does it worry you?

What does it do to your concept of life and choices?

Do you suppose Adam and Eve made use of teachable moments to include talking about their own sin at some point in Seth's development?

What might be the reason Seth's descendants continued to "call on the name of the LORD"?

Is it important to instruct children in the consequences of sin?

Is it reasonable that Adam and Eve would have shared the revelation the LORD gave them regarding the origin of all things?

Is there any Scriptural evidence for written records of these things?

Is there reason to believe that the constellations could have been used as memory devices for telling the story of the prophesied solution to the sin problem?

Is it reasonable that ancient parents could have answered the questions of their children about evil in the world by including the prophecies of hope and noting that the stories developed about the stars can be used to remind us?

Although astrology – using stars to predict personal future – was forbidden, might the stars creation as "signs" include being clues to prophecy, such as crushing the serpent's head – the first prophecy given to Eve?

The ancient Zodiac starts with Virgo the Virgin and ends with Leo the triumphant Lion, going through evil figures conflicting with heroic figures. Ophiuchus holds the Serpent and crushes the Scorpion with his heel. Orion is crushing an enemy with his heel. Although there is disagreement about the evidence, a pattern seems evident.
